AG Frosh: Hagerstown Woman Pleads Guilty to Abuse of a Vulnerable Adult in the Second Degree

Baltimore, MD (**December 2, 2016**) – Maryland Attorney General Brian E. Frosh announced today that Crystal Sue Gardner-Baker of Hagerstown entered a guilty plea to abuse of a vulnerable adult in the second degree in the Circuit Court for Washington County. The Honorable Daniel P. Dwyer scheduled sentencing for a date in January 2017.

Crystal Sue Gardner-Baker was an employee at The Washington County Human Development Council, a group home in Hagerstown providing both residential and day program services to the developmentally disabled. On June 5, 2015, neighbors of the facility observed and heard Gardener-Baker verbally and physically abusing the victim inside the foyer and kitchen area of the home. The victim was a resident of the facility and is severely intellectually disabled as well as physically disabled. The neighbors also saw Gardener-Baker kicking the victim in the groin region and hitting the victim about the upper body with what they believed was a kitchen utensil. The victim suffered severe contusions to his lower right back region, as well as more severe contusions to his upper rear thighs near the groin area.
