Source of Income Discrimination in Housing

What is Source of Income Discrimination?

Source of income discrimination happens when landlords won't rent to you because of the type of legal income you receive. This can include:

- Housing Vouchers
- Social Security or Disability Benefits
- Veterans' Benefits

- Alimony or Child Support
- Public Assistance

These are all lawful sources of income, and it's against the law for landlords to deny you housing based on them.

Everyone is entitled to equal access to housing, free from discrimination based on their lawful source of income, whether it be vouchers, public assistance, or other non-wage earnings

Under Source of Income Discrimination, It is Illegal for Landlords to:

Refuse to Rent: Landlords cannot deny you housing because of your income source.

Charge Additional Fees: They cannot charge you extra rent or fees because of your income source.

Restrict Housing Options: You cannot be limited to specific units or floors in a building because of your

income source.

Set Different Terms: Landlords cannot impose different lease conditions or deny you amenities, such as

access to common areas, fitness centers, or parking, because of your income

source.

Deny Services: All tenants must receive the same repairs and services, regardless of their income

source

Exclude from Offers: You cannot be excluded from advertised perks or amenities because of your

income source.

Have You Heard?

- "We don't accept Section 8 here."
- "You need a job to rent this apartment."
- "Public assistance isn't reliable enough for us."
- "We have different rent rates for voucher holders."
- "Voucher holders can only live in certain units."

• "We don't rent to people with alimony or child support as their primary income."
